Loss of \$400. Coincides With Disappearance of Hired Man

Suspect Eludes Police During All Day Hunt. Clarence Dougherty Victim of Loss.

Mr. Clarence Dougherty, residing on the corner of the sixth concession of Walpole and the Catholic Church sidewalk, awoke around six o'clock on Friday morning to discover the loss of nearly \$400.00 from his trouser pocket that had been there when he went to bed the previous night.

Investigation with the loss of this large amount of money was the disappearance of John Zolaturuk, his hired man.

Mr. Dougherty, acting upon the natural conclusions to be formed immediately went to Hagersville and notified Constable Hazlett of the disappearance of the money and also the hired man. Further investigation in Jarvis revealed that the hired man had passed through here around 2 A.M. toward Simcoe and was seen by Constable Banks. Investigation at Simcoe revealed he had purchased a bus ticket to Alymer. At Alymer it was learned he had spent some time there and was later seen heading toward St. Thomas. His trail ended there, however, and no further trace of him could be found. Provincial Officer McBride, of Dunnville also assisted in the search.

Zolaturuk started to work for Mr. Dougherty last October and been steadily employed since. His home is in Millgrove, north of Hamilton.
