The latter haif of the growing season, is a good time to make an attack on perennial weeds. There is not quite the same rush of work in the same

There is, however, considerable variation in the number of cultivations required to kill perennial weeds and it should be remembered that an old established stand of perennials is more difficult to kill than a young growth of the same species. Keeping down all top growth from July 15 to the end of the growing season will greatly reduce the stand of perennial weeds but for complete eradication of a persistent weed like couch grass, this treatment should be followed up in the next year by a hoed crop, such as corn or potatoes. This treatment has, over a long period of years, given very satisfactory results on the Central Experimental Farm, Ottawa, states Geo. Knowles, of the Field Husban-
