Not long ago I heard a prominent physician remark at a public gathering that the science of medicine had decreased the death rate of children and prolonged the lives of the aged but had failed miserably in its efforts to conquer the diseases of middle age. When we read that heart, arterial and kidney ailments still claim more victims than any other diseases, that we still have a death rate of 30 per cent to 35 per cent. in pneumonia, we must agree that no great progress has been made. Diabetea in spite of the great claims made for insulin, (and it undoubtedly has given great temporary relief) has shown a marked increase in death rate in the last few years. What hope then is there for prevention of these diseases or relief for one already afflicted?

The Heart, Arterial and Ridney Diseases

Let us consider the heart, arterial and kidney diseases first. These organs are very closely related in

Let us consider the heart, arterial and kidney diseases first. These organs are very closely related in function, so much so in fact, that we seldom see chronic diseases of one without at least one of the others being affected also. A valvular heart condition nearly always produces a change in blood pressure in time, which in turn produces hard ened arteries and often kidney involvement. Similarly, kidney disease, through checking elimination of waste, results in a rising blood pressure and a strain on the heart. Each organ depends to some extent upon the other, if it is to keep healthy and normal in function.

Importance of Normal Nerve

Function

If we could state in one word the main cause of most of these diseases it would be the word "excess." Eating to excess, drinking to excess, excessive work, excessive worry, in fact any excess places a strain upon one or all of these organs. Some people, however, can go to excess apparently without for a long period of time.
