## Roosevelt, King Meet at Opening of New International Bridge



President Franklin D. Roosevelt, of the United States, and Premier W. L. Mackenzie King, of Canada, met at Kingston, Ont., on August 17, when the new Thousand Islands international bridge system was officially opened. The president stayed in Kingston over night, and on the following day received an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from Queen's University. Above photo shows the designers' conception of the new suspension span crossing the American channel from Collins Landing to Wellesley Island, one of the five separate spans and eight-and-a-half miles of approaches and connecting roadways comprising the Thousand Islands international bridge system from Collins Landing and Ivy Lea, Ont. 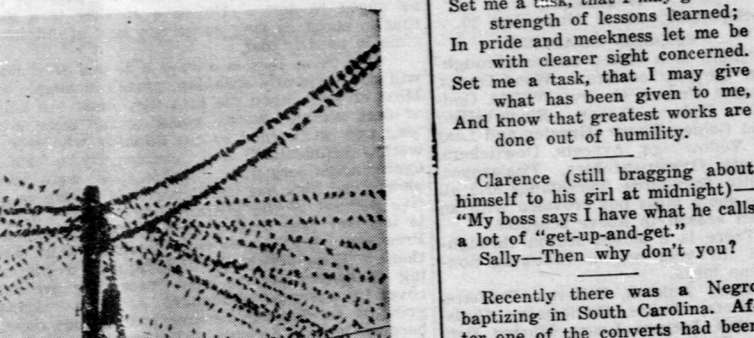

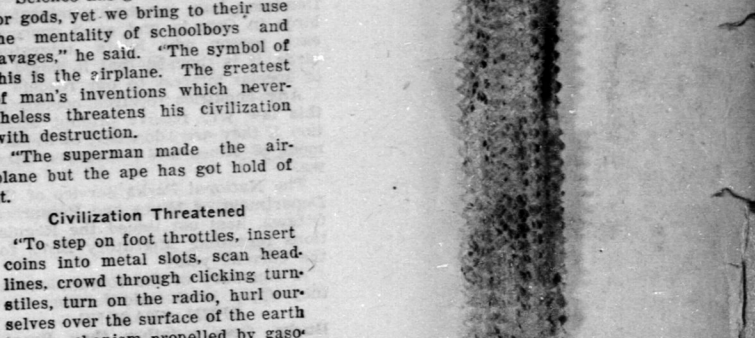

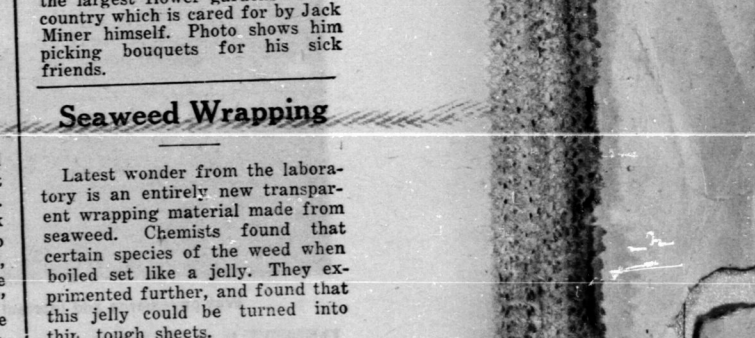
