Allen Jamieson Only New Man in Council Reeve, Percy L. Buck, was returned as Chief Magistrate of the Township of Woodhouse in Monday's election for a third term, defeating Thomas Matthews, a former Reeve of the municipality, who opposed him.

Buck polled 622 votes to his opponent's 583. James Moore was returned to the Deputy-Reevehip, by a majority of 284 over his opponent, Harry Sherik, who polled a total of 303 votes.
