WALPOLE COUNCIL RETURNED TO OFFICE BY ACCLAMATION

The next speaker, in dealing with Township expenditures this year, the Deputy Reeve stated that it had cost \$3000.00 to repair Township roads this Spring due to some extent to poor base construction. An additional cost to the ratepayers this year was the \$900 expended for the purpose of weed cutting. The speaker advised that the Township belong with all other Townships in the County were now included in the County game preserve, and dealt at some length regarding the license required for hunting rabbits, and pheasants in season. "A person is not considered a resident, except in the municipality where he has a legislative vote" said the speaker. In drawing attention to the overdraft being carried by the municipality this year, the speaker pointed out that each school section receives the amount of their requisition from the council every year on December 15th. It was necessary for the Council to borrow a portion of the money thus paid out from the Bank at 5 per cent interest and in many cases the treasurer of the School Section merely takes it back to the Bank, where it draws only one and one half per cent. In this connection Mr. Dennis felt a saving in interest could be made to the municipality if school monies were paid over a period of three or four times a year. The speaker also explained the cost of legal expenses as shown on the financial statement and covered the operations of the County Home. Before taking his seat, Mr. Dennis asked the support of the ratepayers for the office of Reeve if an election was held, but expressed the hope that the expense of an election would be saved the ratepayers this year.
Mr. Earl Catherwood, Councillor, expressed the belief that the action of Council in defending the assessment of the Dominion Gas Co. against appeal was justified, and made comparison with other assessments in the municipality to support his contentions. He also stated he had been a strong supporter of the Township operated quarry at Sarnik which discontinued operations this year. According to Mr. Catherwood the roads are now at a point where screenings are satisfactory. He also expressed himself as opposed to any further issuance of debentures at this time.
In referring to the Bank Overdraft this year, Mr. Harvey McKenzie, the youngest member of the Council from point of service, stated that in the past eight years the Township had paid over \$2000. In his brief remarks, he supported the remarks of a former speaker, in making the payments of school monies over three or four times during the year instead of the entire amount on December 15th and thus avoid an overdraft. He stated that he would have this work done as far as possible by relief labor, and section had over \$1000. in cash in the bank drawing 1 1/2 per cent where as the Council had paid the section their requisition in full and borrowed the money at 5 per cent to do so. He stated that it would be his effort to alter this situation if returned to the Council. "The condition of the roads is much better throughout the Township this year," said the speaker although I think \$900. is too much to pay out for this purpose.
Councillor E. S. Pond, discussed briefly the work of the relief committee, of which he was a member along with Reeve Parkinson, and also mentioned the work of the road construction. He expressed the hope that next year's Council would see fit to have the Woodruff bridge painted in order that the iron work would be preserved against nature. "This is one of the largest expenditures ever made by the Township," said Mr. Pond, "and I think we should make every effort to preserve it as

far as possible."
Mr. E. S. Giles, nominated for Council questioned the salary of the County Engineer, and the cost of cutting weeds. "Some men got more for cutting weeds on a 50 acre farm, than those with a 200 acre farm," said Mr. Giles. While he did not blame the Council particularly in this connection, he felt that too much trust was placed in the farmer, and that some valued their services too high.
Mr. Frank Wilson, nominated for Council, thanked the mover and second of his nomination, and said he never had ambitions for public office although if he ever accepted public office he would want to feel he could be of real service to the municipality. "I would not consider standing unless all offices are open" said Mr. Wilson, "and if I did, I would do my best for the Township of Walpole."
Mr. Wanley Lindsay, also nominated for Council in opening his remarks stated that he didn't approve of men on relief driving a car all summer and having their bread handed to them in the winter. He stated he had no quarrel with Township expenditures but was dissatisfied with certain County expenditures. The speaker expressed dissatisfaction with the method of representation in the County Council. He pointed out that Walpole has two representatives in the County body, to one from the Township of Sherbrooke, while Walpole pay approximately \$45,000 per year toward County Administration appropriated to approximately \$500 from the Township of Sherbrooke, he also made comparison with the urban municipalities in the County. The speaker criticized the County Council in raising the County Engineer's pay, when farmer's revenues were decreased this year more than 40 per cent. He said there had been a considerable sacrifice to raise taxes for December 14th, and he would like to see a decrease in the spending end. "I would not cause an election," said Mr. Lindsay, but if under circumstances I do stand, I would solicit the support of the ratepayers.
Mr. Frank Laidlaw, a former Reeve of the Municipality was called upon in his brief remarks, he said that in his opinion the Council does the best they can from year to year, but there never will be a Council that do not make mistakes. In dealing with the weed cutting problem, the speaker said he would have this work done as far as possible by relief labor, and would try to give every man an opportunity to make a living. In closing his remarks the speaker said, "I hope one year from to-day we will still have democracy in Canada." "In the minds of a great many people this is a problem to-day."
Mr. H. W. Parkinson was the last speaker, being given an opportunity to reply to criticism of administration that had been made. After expressing himself in this connection he reviewed briefly his career as a servant of the municipality. "I have always been a pleasure to represent with Reeve Parkinson, and also sent Walpole both as Councillor and touched upon road maintenance," said Mr. Parkinson, "and I hope I have been instrumental in doing a little good for the Township to have the Woodruff bridge painted. If my services have been any good to the municipality I would then ask your support as is one of the largest expenditures ever made by the Township." "I am not present at the meeting."
