COUNTIES TO ASK HIGHER SUBSIDIES FOR ROAD IMPROVEMENT
Good Roads Association To Hold Special Session On Wednesday, Next Week. J. McGeer, M.P. To Speak.
Hamilton, February 14 - The need for increasing the present fifty percent road subsidies in Ontario will be the keynote of the forthcoming 26th annual convention of the Ontario Good Roads Association at the Royal York Hotel, Toronto. Two Royal Commissions, it was pointed out here today by an association official, have found that two thirds of road construction and maintenance cost should be borne by those who actually use the roads, and the balance by other interests.
