(By 'Specialist') Ottawa, June 14th.—The new loans of \$0 per cent up to \$0 per cent Housing Act now before the parliament at Ottawa aims to promote a certain allowance to companies on the case of houses costing less than \$4,000 the Dominion will pay all the first year municipal and school tax included, for the second year it will pay 50 per cent of these tax-dollars to aid in the construction of low cost housing and 20 million for low rental house construction.
