Scientist Says IQ is Not Fixed—
It May Go Up Or Down —
Whole Concept of Intelligence
Must Be Reformulated.

The IQ-short for intelligence quotient as measured by standardized tests—is a variable element in the composition of a human being, it was pointed out in a recent paper by Beth L. Wellman of the Iowa Child Welfare Research station at Iowa

It was once the opinion of most psychologists that the IQ was fixed. that, for instance, a child who had a low mental rating would never rise above it, and vice versa. It isn't so, Prof. Wellman insists, for "there is now no escape from the fact that children's IQ have possibilities of change over practically the whole range from genius to feebleminded-ness."
