

The average rural mail box is a good deal easier for the patron to handle than it is for the rural mail courier, says the Seaforth Expositor. There are some perfect ones, of course, but we are talking about the average, and the door on the average mail box is something that won't stay shut; that won't stay open; that breaks off; that sticks, and that always squeaks.

That does not bother the man who is getting his mail. He only has one box to open. With the courier, however, it is something else. He has several miles of them to open and close, and in wet and wintry weather that is some job when he has to use a different technique on almost every box.

No Door At All

Apparently the rural mail couriers across the line have experienced similar troubles with the boxes of their patrons. But now they are going to end it all.
