

The hunter must proceed against the wind to get within firing range, if still-hunting, and he must learn

The most favorable conditions, of course, are when the leaves are off the trees, the ground is wet or covered with a good tracking snow, and there is no wind blowing. But we can't always pick the best times for our hunts, so must rely upon skill and a knowledge of the habits of the deer to secure our trophies.
