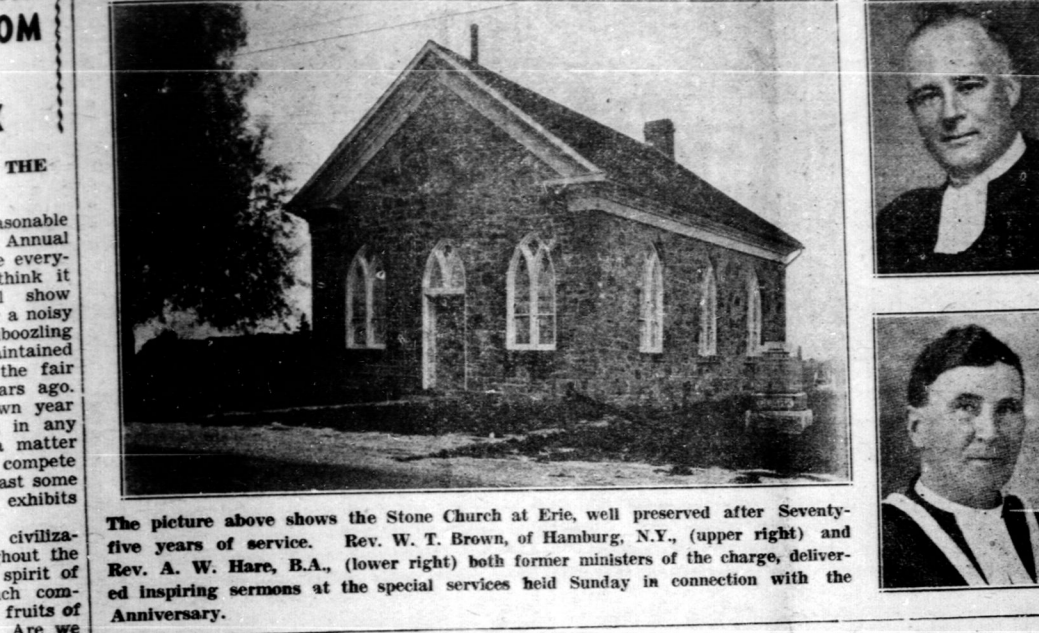

BARONESS LEE WINS CANADIAN FUTURITY

ness which was located on the south west corner of Main and Talbot Streets. He operated this business for two years and then became agent for Crandall & Co., of Buffalo and superintended the shipment of his horses to the Canadian Futurity. In 1903 he started business for himself and shipped horses to the Canadian Futurity. He was this occupied until 1922. He established a sales stable in the City of Winnipeg and shipped hundreds of horses from the East during that period. He shipped as high as twenty-six stallions of horses in one year from the Jarvis station. The demand for Eastern horses in the prairie began to fall off after the war and in 1922 he discontinued the business entirely. His just about everything there is to know about good horse flesh, and probably this has something to do with the success of the Owen Stables in the trotting game, since that time.

In fact, Len Owen is one of those boys who might well be written up in the home town paper under the heading "Home Town Boy Makes Good."
Before reaching the age of Twenty one, he bought, operated, and sold at a substantial profit, the Mount Hamilton Bus Lines. The Mount Hamilton Lines were built largely through his ingenuity. He also owned the Hamilton-Brimford Bus Lines, which he has since disposed of. For a period of two years he operated in partnership the Port Colborne-Buffalo Line, known as the Erie Bus Lines. He then bought the Southern Coach Lines, from Simcoe - St. Catharines - Niagara. This business has also been sold, and at the present time he conducts an automobile accessory business in Tillsonburg and operates a bus line from that place to Brantford. His establishment is also the bus terminal for all lines running to or through the town of Tillsonburg.
His interest in trotting horses is a heritage. Like his father he has owned many horses, but Lee Hanover was the first real success of the stable. He has full charge of training and is now taking his place on the sulky. As a trainer he has had two winners in the Canadian Futurity, with one setting the mark as Canada's fastest trotter, and as a driver he guided Baroness Lee to first place in the great harness race over Canada, when men all claim that which he achieved, was certainly glad to say Jarvis is Len Owen's home town.
