## A Weekly Review Of National Affairs

(By "Spectator")  
Ottawa, September 20th. The atmosphere of tension caused by the bewildering and terrifying march of events in Czechoslovakia was much relieved during the past week by the dramatic visit of Mr. Chamberlain, the British Prime Minister, to the British Embassy in Berlin. On the results of these conversations hang the hopes of the civilized world. The Prime Minister of the Dominion, Mr. Mackenzie King, in a wire to Mr. Chamberlain, expressed the deep satisfaction of the government at the visit. "I am sure," Mr. King said, "that the whole Canadian people will approve this far-reaching and truly noble action on the part of Mr. Chamberlain. Direct personal contact is the most effective means of clearing away the tension and misunderstanding which have marred the course of events in Europe in recent months. Mr. Chamberlain has taken emphatically the right step."

## FOUR POWER CONFERENCE IN SESSION

To-Day's Meeting At Munich May Yet Bring Peaceful Settlement

Premier Chamberlain of Great Britain, Premier Daladier, of France, Premier Mussolini, of Italy and Herr Hitler, of Germany are meeting in a four power conference in Munich, Germany.

It is understood the conference was arranged by Mussolini at the request of Chamberlain, who has been working constantly to avert war by peaceful negotiations.

President Roosevelt of the United States is also credited with influencing Hitler to agree to decide to further efforts toward peaceful settlement.

In addition it is believed the conference may lead to a broad European settlement and will include other problems besides the Sudeten crisis.

Issues between the Democratic Countries and the Dictatorship States of Italy and Germany have been gaining momentum in recent years and the Sudeten question is only one of the problems to be worked out in order to ensure a peaceful future for the civilized world.

Although the imminent danger of war was greatly cleared yesterday by the announcement of the four power conference, the four powers are still at odds.

It is believed, however, that the conference will bring about a new peace and bring about harmonious relations between the countries of Europe.
