How Can I?

Q—How can I treat the sewing machine which has seen years of hard service and seems ready to be discarded?
A—Take off the head and boil it for about an hour in strong soda. This will clean it of all the old hardened oil and grease. Dry it, replace it, oil it thoroughly, and see if it does not show a hundred per cent. improvement.

A—Serve the watercress with French dressing, made tart with lemon, and sprinkled with Roquefort cheese.
Q—How can I dry my hair more quickly after washing?
A—Try this method: light the oven, turn the gas low, lower the oven door, and then place the electric fan on the lowest speed. The circulated air will quickly dry the hair.
Q—How can I keep water warm when there is no hot water heater in the house?
A—Try keeping the tea kettle on the pilot light of the gas range at all times when not in active use. It will keep the water warm, and the job of boiling it will not be lengthy one.

Making Chickens Grow

Growing chickens need some form of vitamin A to make satisfactory growth. Birds allowed to range about the farm during the growing season usually pick up sufficient quantities of green feed, but birds confined should have some feed that is rich in vitamin A. Alfalfa-leaf meal is one of the most economical sources of vitamin A, when all feeds must be purchased, and may serve as the sole source of this vitamin.
