Although this picture was not made while the British planes were flying over France, it was snapped for the capress purpose of showing the planes and formations used. The planes are Wellington bombers of the very latest issue. On July 14th, during the French national celebrations, five squadrons of these bombers and fighters, flew to the southwest of France and back, on normal training flights. Inasmuch as the distance was the same as it would be to leading industrial centres of Germany, the parade of England's air might became an impressive factor in the present European game of "pow er politics." The flights were concluded without the slightest mishap.

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


