CHEAPER PLASTIC

The chemists mate that this new compound be manufactured for less than alf the cost of the cheapest synhetic plastic compounds now on market.

VITAMINS AND OLD AGE Evidence that senility and other mptoms of old age are accom-anied by typical signs of vitamin deficiency was presented recently by Professor L. A. Cherkes, direcor of the Odessa Institute of Nutrition, U.S.S.R. Experiments on mimals and numerous observations on patients showed, he reported, that the processes taking place on teeth and bones in old age do not differ in anything from e resulting from a deficiency of vitamins in the organism. The bservations have led Professor Cherkes to conclude that the d gestive tract not only absorbs vi-famins from food but also transforms a number of inactive food emponents into active vitamins. As the body grows older this capacity of the digestive tract grows weaker. Many symptoms of senil-ity, hitherto regarded as manifesions of an inevitable physiological pocess, he believes, are but a result of the body not keeping up with its requirements in vitamins, which must be supplied in greater amounts with the advance of the

Discovery of a new metallic compound capable of cutting and othing the toughest metals and harder than the hardest steel used to manufacture tools was reported to the American Chemical Society by Philip M. McKenna of the Mc-Kenna Metals Company, Latrobe, Pa. The material is obtained by heating tungsten, titanium and carbon in crucibles of pure graphite, the mixture being heated in a bath of molten nickel to a tem-perature of 2,000 degrees for a prolonged period. The new com-pound is only 0.2 softer than a diamond, the hardest substance known; and is expected, because of its ability to retain a sharp cutting edge at high temperatures, to increase the speed with which stainless steels can be machined,

Rudy Vallee Makes a Change Rudy Vallee and Standard Brands Inc. are terminating their radio contract at the end of Vallee's tenth year on the networks and concluding the longest association in radio of a sponsor and a performer. Vallee's final broadcast under the auspices of Standard Brands will occur on Thursday, September 28, 1939, closing an unbroken radio run on the NBC red network from 8.00 to 9.00 p.m. which commenced on October 24, 1929, when commercial radio broad-

casting was in its infancy.

Vallee, who was radio's initial phenomenon, was the first to give evidence of the power of broadduction of most of present stars of casting as a starmaker the air to the microphone audience led him to become radio's pioneer showman.
