A WEEKLY REVIEW OF NATIONAL AFFAIRS

Ottawa, December 28th — A Tule-tide atmosphere has settled on the capital, but it is the Christmas spirit of a nation at ease in which gaiety and cheerfulness are intermingled. There is the satisfaction and pride felt here as elsewhere throughout the country that the first Canadian division are comfortably settled in billets in Britain, having crossed the sea without mishap. This successful crossing under the wing of the main battle fleet, recent naval exploits, and the announcement of the Commonwealth Air Training Plan have been climbing in war's dark hours. Except during the bare holidays there is however no pause in the war effort by the various agencies at work at Ottawa.

Word has been given out by the minister of national defence that from 6,000 to 7,000 corps troops will be sent over as auxiliaries to the 14th Army. Being the last meeting of the year the first division of the Corps will be a squadron of the Royal Canadian Air Force, under the command of Squadron Leader Van Vleet of Winnipeg. It is a Toronto unit which will draw for its complement of 1,000 men from all parts of the province and Ottawa. The additional forces will also be comprised of medical, heavy artillery, an artillery survey unit, engineers, signal units, army pits units and a fully equipped dental unit. The despatch of the air squadron illustrates the importance of the air service not only in its own special sphere but as an aid to the military forces in the field. The duty of the squadron will be to cooperate with ground troops to obtain information concerning enemy movements, gun positions and observation posts.

The minister of national defence has told us that over 65,000 men have been enlisted in the Canadian active service force and that over 10,000 are guarding our coastal defences, a precaution made necessary by the sweeping changes that have taken place in offensive arms since the last war. The personnel of the Canadian navy is over 5,000 and the present strength of the air force is over 8,000 officers and men and the number is growing rapidly.

The Commonwealth Air Training Plan

Of the greatest magnitude and of the utmost importance to the prosecution of the war in the British Commonwealth Air Training Plan, which this project is in full operation there will be 67 training schools throughout Canada. The staff of these schools and fields not including the student body of airmen from Canada, Australia, New Zealand and Great Britain amounting advanced training, will receive to 40,000. For the first time in the history of the air force and of the transport department have been carrying out preliminary work, including sites for the schools, making surveys and planning necessary structures. It is believed that Australia and New Zealand will supply one-fifth of the students to be trained in Canada. Preliminary instruction will be given at home and there are, of course, advanced schools in those dominions in which many students will receive final instruction. But many will come to Canada and Britain.

The British Government will see that schools are kept fully supplied with student uniforms. It is estimated that the vast enterprise will involve a total of 600 million dollars for the three and one-quarter years which is the prospective term of its life, the expense to be divided among the four partners in the plan on an agreed basis.

Official War Recorder Appointed

Distinctive Flag for Canada? When parliament meets late in January, it is believed that when the major issues involved in Canada's war effort have been discussed and acted upon by the people's representatives, the country may adopt a national flag. The standard of the first British war flag, the Union Jack, Maple Leaves and Fleur de Lis, has met with such favorable comment that it is felt that it may be accepted as the flag for the country. Colonel Fortescue Duguid of Ottawa made the design.
