Q.-How can I launder a gar ment of brush wool?

A .- Make a suds of pure flakes and warm water. Squeeze the garment in the suds, changing the water frequently. Rinse thoroughly, adding a few soap flakes to the last rinsing. Spread out flat to dry, turning the garment when one side is dry. Q.-How can I add a few

pounds when slightly under-weight? A .- Olive - oil is excellent for this purpose; and to make it more palatable try adding a pinch of salt to a wine-glass of the oil. Q.—How can I make a flaky

A .- Pie crust, in which a half teaspoonful of baking powder is added to every cup of flour, will be unusually light and flaky.






