Mr. McCuiston said every effort was being made by his department to avoid any serious traffic mishaps which might mar the pleasure of the Royal Visit.

The program was designed as a tribute to King George and his keen interest in accident prevention.

The highways minister urged all motorists to cooperate in attempts being made to prevent heavy congestion on roads leading to cities where means of avoiding congestion and delay.

To the end of promoting traffic safety and motorist comfort, department of highways engineers have mapped out alternative routes which if followed, will relieve some of the pressure on the main routes and help to avoid some of the heavy congestion. The map also emphasizes the roads, apart from the principal highways, by which motorists may travel safely and comfortably to see the Royal celebrations.
