STRAWBERRY TIME
Here are some more delicious strawberry recipes:
Strawberry Salad
2 cups ripe strawberries
1 cup celery diced
1 cup vinegar
1 tablespoon cinnamon
1/2 tablespoon cloves.
Pick the strawberries place a layer in a stone jar, then sprinkle in a little cinnamon and cloves, then a layer of berries then spices until all are used. Bring the vinegar and sugar to boiling point, let stand overnight. In the morning boil the berries as before, pour over the berries as before, allow to stand overnight. SAVE YOUR NECK!
