Bumper Crop

Universities of Canada Granted More Degrees Than Usual This Year

Canada had a bumper crop of university graduates this year, ac-cording to the Canadian Press sur-vey of the "Class of "39" in 18 Canadian universities from coast to coast. As the graduating class finally earned the "'39" pin, a chershed hope of from three to seven years, nearly every degree-granting college reported more graduates than in any year since 1935. Total figure for men and women finishing their ourses in all branches of higher education this tear is 5,875 compared with 5,525 1938. In the years 1936-7 the alleber was estimated at 5,750 thile in 1935 an all-time peak of 6,250 was reached.

Vocational Diplomas Popular Last year's notable tendency to-ward vocational diplomas coninues and the percentage of "finished" co-eds has risen in some olleges almost to the half-way mark, the survey shows. University authorities trace the upswing back to the economic optimism of 1935-6 when most 1939 graduates began their college areers. Many ofifcials predict an even stronger army will step out into the business and professional world next spring.

Upward, Westward Tendency As usual, larger universities are good barometers of academic trends, McGill, Toronto, Alberta and Dalhousie registering most obvious increases. The "upward and westward" tendency most eviden in 1935 continues at slackened pace as most western colleges report further swelling of graduate
