



Bookkeeping equipment is augmented with a new cash book. It will hardly be said, however, that the last one has not served its purpose faithfully and well. The cash book to be discarded has been in use since the Village was incorporated on December 22nd, 1909 — thirty years ago this December.

The old book is in itself a history of the Village, and one could spend many an interesting hour looking through it's pages.

The first item in the receipts was from the late C. G. Alien for \$163.06, who prior to the incorporation of the Village was treasurer of the Board of Police Commissioners. The first item of expense was to the late J. C. Sanderson, an amount of \$27.50 for lumber. It was interesting to note that the total receipts for the first year as a Village was \$4,296.63, total expenditures \$3,346.27, leaving a cash balance of \$953.36. Tax returns were also good, as arrears amounted to only \$10.00. The first auditors of the Village books were J. S.
