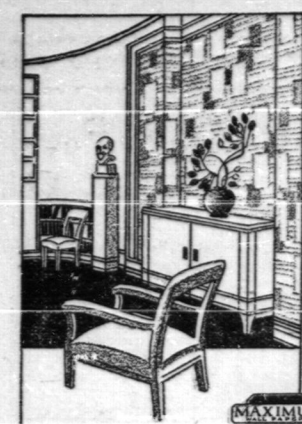

## Jarvis Ahead on 13th Power Bill

A check for \$130.05 was received by the Treasurer of the Jarvis Hydro Commission this week representing a credit on hydro consumption for the fiscal year ending October 31st. The total billings of the local commission over that period amounted to \$5,888.50, while the cost of the power supplied to the local commission by the Ontario Hydro Commission was \$5,888.50. Therefore leaving a balance of \$130.05.

It is interesting to note the various items that go to make up the total charge for hydro to the local commission:

Power	\$97.00
Operating Maintenance	\$178.85
Interest	\$238.75
Depreciation	\$258.92
Provision for contingencies	\$166.23
Provision for sinking fund	\$53.91
Cost in excess of revenue for power sold to private companies	\$8.86
<b>Total</b>	<b>\$5808.45</b>

It will be noticed that local hydro users pay the sum of \$8.86 per year to the Jarvis Hydro Commission for hydro sold by the commission to private companies.

## Weekly Review of National Affairs

Easing of International Tension  
Ottawa, March 14th — Relief is shown in parliamentary circles in the growing improvement in the international situation. However, heated arguments have been the rule in the House of Commons on domestic problems. When it was discovered that France's victory in Spain did not, as it was feared it might, lead to the pent up floods of European rivalry, the relief was naturally very welcome. In the commons, optimism over the easing of the tension was expressed by the Prime Minister.

Trade Treaty Approved in Commons  
The new trade treaty with the United States which has been under discussion at intervals for about three weeks has passed its initial stage in the commons. The resolution embodying the principle of the treaty passed the commons without a recorded vote. A great many speakers took part in the debate, opposition members putting up a barrage of criticism. This is not the end of the discussion in the house. The bill will soon be introduced and each individual item in the treaty will be discussed. The trade treaty is considered by the government as a measure of great importance as it establishes the board which will make all contracts for munitions and other defence equipment.

Other speakers on the program include John D. MacLeod, Secretary of the Ontario Field Crop Improvement Association; J. B. Brown, Chemistry Department, C.A.C. Guelph, and the judges who will comment on the exhibits.

In addition to the many exhibits in the regular classes, there will be a number of educational exhibits which will be found to be most interesting. A fanning mill screen service will also be provided for those who need assistance along that line. The Seed Fair will be a good place to get good seed and to arrange for your supply for spring needs.

During the morning a Seed Judging Competition will be conducted for Junior farmers and this will be followed immediately by a Cream Grading Contest, the prizes for which have been provided entirely by the Creameries of the county. The afternoon program will commence promptly at 2:30 o'clock. The Fair is being held in the Town Hall, Cayuga.
