# Dairy Personalities of Canada

EDITOR'S NOTE: The article reproduced herewith is taken from the current issue of the Canadian Dairy and Ice Cream Journal the official organ of the Dairy Industry in Canada. We feel sure our readers will be interested to peruse the article as it appeared in this widely read journal.



LEA MARSHALL

(President and General Manager, Marshall Dairy Ltd., Jarvis Ont. First Vice President, Dairyman's Association of Western Ontario; Western Vice President, Ontario Creamery Association.)

Born and raised on a farm at Langton, County of Norfolk, Ontario, he is an excellent example of "country bred milk good" - at home, as his dairymen have built up in the district where he was born and has lived nearly all his life.

He attended public school at Langton, then went to business college and later took a course at the Dairy School, the latter in 1906 when he was nineteen years old. But he started in dairymen much earlier, as at the age of fifteen he was learning the art and science of cheese-making at Parson's Cheese Factory, Jarvis, Ont., under Mr. Frank Boyce's chain of factories, spending two years at the local system, the local hydro service is expected to be exceptionally good. He has too, given liberally of his time and services to civic affairs; after serving as a member of the Ontario last year in 1927, he was elected Reeve in 1929 and has served in that capacity ever since; he was also Warden of the County of Haldimand in 1936. In the last Provincial election he was his first entry into politics, was defeated by the Hon. Eric Cross Minister of Public Health.

Outside his business interests, he is keenly interested in fraternal and Masonic affairs. He is a Past Noble Grand of the Norfolk Lodge No. 225, I.O.O.F., Port Dover; Past Master of the Norfolk Lodge No. 149, F.A.M., Port Dover, also a Member of the Hindoo Koosh Lodge No. 149, F.A.M., Port Dover, and has served the Wesley United Church since 1927.

Certainly a career of which anyone might be proud, but that nature in Lea's character. He is a modest and unassuming personality, but when in the corner of the industry a knotty point crops up and there is need for keen insight and clear judgment, then his tolerant, common-sense attitude towards all problems is of the greatest help in solving these.

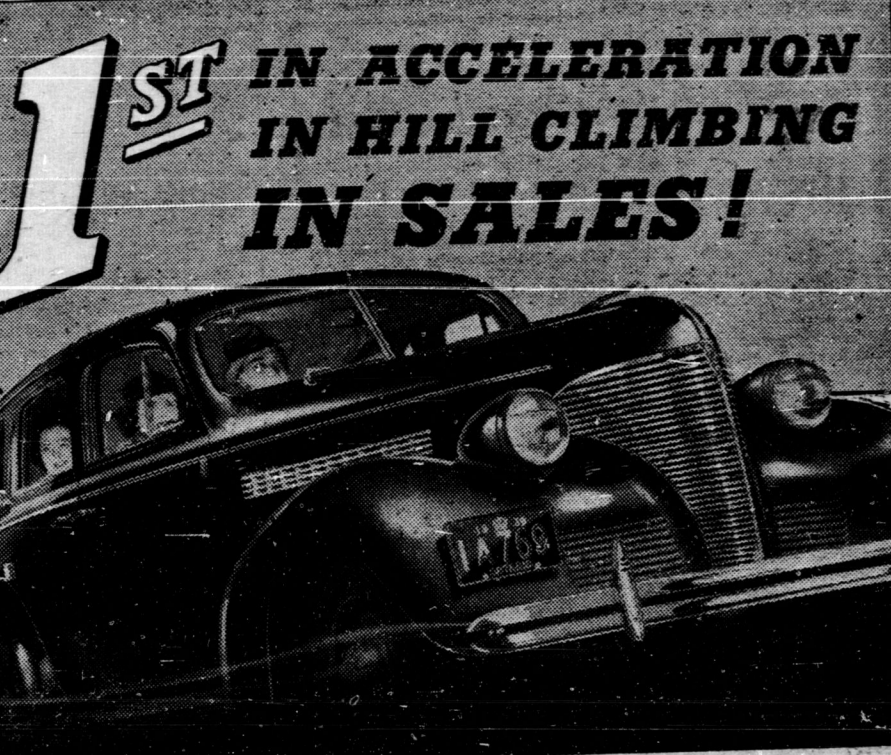

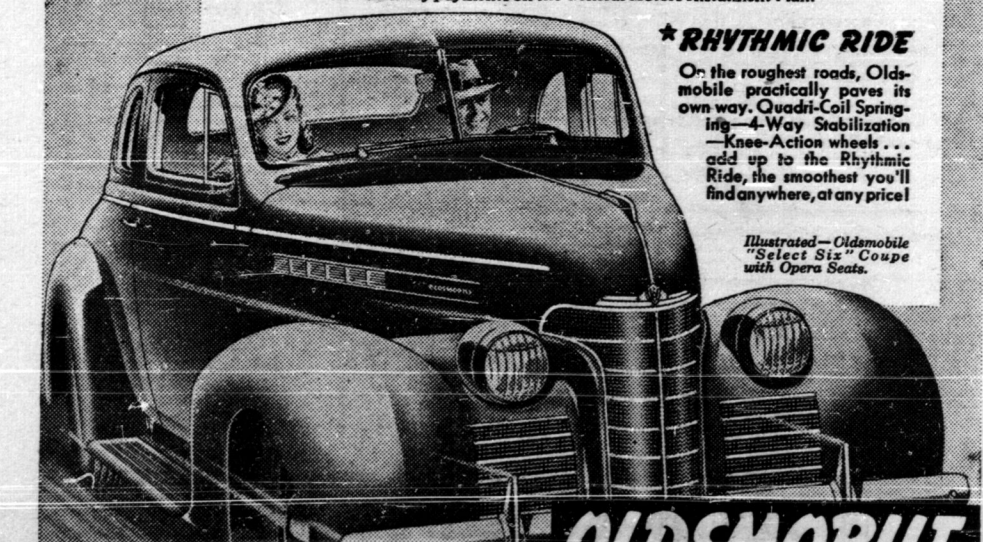
