

How Can 1? BY ANNE ASHLEY Q.-How can I prepare Melba A .- Melba toast is made merely by slicing sandwich bread thin, cutting off the edges, and placing in the oven to brown.

Q.—How can I remove stains from my fingers?

A.—Use a little powdered pumice mixed with 2 few drops of

olive oil. Use an orange stick wrapped with cot under the finger nails. Q.—How can I prevent the sew-ing machine needle from unthreading when the cloth is being remov-ed from the machine?

A .- Raise the needle to the highest point and this will prevent the needle from unthreading.
Q.—How can I make delicious deviled eggs?

A .- The following is a good recipe: One tablespoon mustard, 1/2 tablespoon but teaspoon salt; 1/2 tablespoon but teaspoon sait, 12 tablespoon sate, 6 eggs hard cooked. Cut the eggs in halves, mash the yolks, season with salt, mustard and add 14 tablespoon melted butter. Fill the egg whites.
