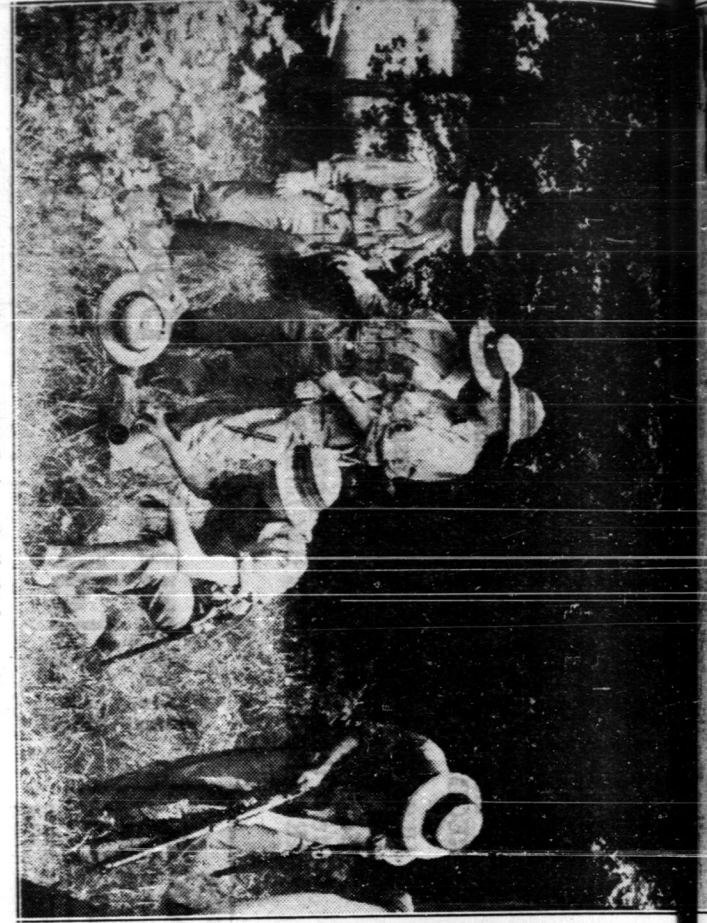

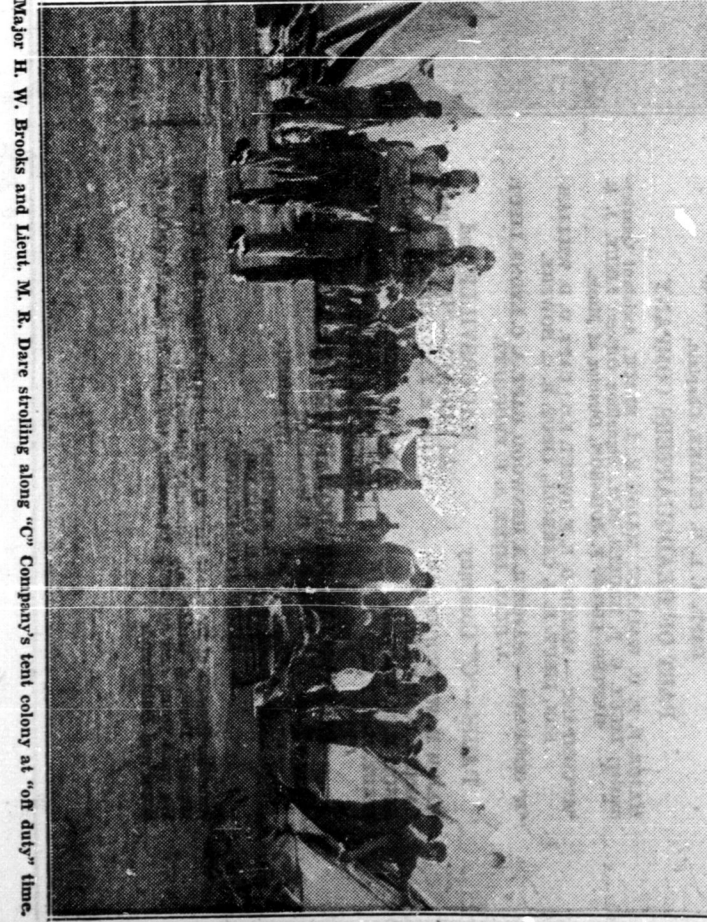

north. Company houses, a keen source of dissatisfaction in many camps, rent at Noranda from \$20. to \$35. a month and are better equipped than those which bring \$5. a month. Mr. Murdoch freely admitted that the company's policy was to pay the men \$5. a day, and that they should not be paid more than \$5. a day. Under a pension plan the company banks the savings and the employee can withdraw the entire amount if he leaves the unit at any time after five years' work.

Mr. Murdoch wishes he qualified for a holiday, as a senior employee. He is always at the Toronto head office or at one of the mines, and when he is home at night he studies maps and reports as a hobby. As well as the Noranda and C.N.R. jobs, he is president of Canadian Copper Refiners, Walter Amulet Mines, Hail-ore Mines, Fenner Porcupine, Gold-ore Mines and the Office Specialty Manufacturing Co., and director of the Bank of Nova Scotia, British W.B. American Oil Co., Hollinger Consolidated, International Nickel, Canadian Wire & Cable, Wright-Har-vegreaves Mines. "I find myself taking on new jobs all the time and working too hard, but there are always wheels within wheels," he explains hopefully.

As for the future, he observes no indications that business will slacken and so decreases his responsibilities. He foresees "a gradual readjustment of business, an increase in trade between nations and a passing of recent abnormal conditions." In the north, mining is "still far from the peak it will someday reach. The future of the north will be greater than its present."

For his own future, he hopes for a retirement at not too distant a date, and a very long rest. He wants to enjoy his cottage at Muskoka and settle down to the serious business of running his Valley Crest Farm, where he raises pure-bred Guernsey cattle and Clyde horses—and for a little while forgets mining.
