There is only one way to keep milk sweet, and that is to keep it clean and cool. The milk as produced by the cow is practically all free from bacteria, and will keep for a long time if not allowed to become contaminated with bactia from the air, dirty utensiis, or other sources. One should heep in mind that bacteria are everywhere and that it is very hard to keep them out of anything that one is handling. When the bacteria see into the milk they grow and act on the milk sugar, forming lactic acid

the milk sugar, forming lactic sold and thus causing sour milk.

Use Sterile Utensils

If you take the milk as the cow produces it and handle it in such a manner that the bacteria count a manner that the bacteria count is low, you can keep it sweet for a long time by keeping it at a temp-
