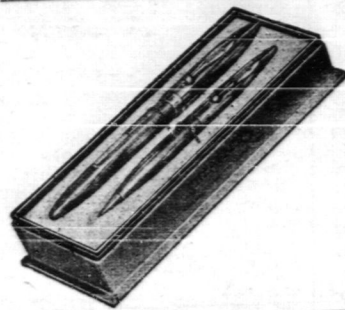

The story reminded a local authority that in the last war mosquitoes, black flies and snowflits were used cheaply and effectively as guards for a couple of thousand Germans interned at Kapuskasing.

Kapuskasing was not then the healthy town it is today. It was some tar-paper shacks in a very small clearing surrounded by a lousy stinging nettle. Only once that the authority members did the interned attempt a break in their monotony. It happened early in the first summer. Thirty or forty prisoners made off into the bush but nobody tried to chase them. Somebody just put a light in the clearing and waited. It was back then that they would come back in time and they would come back after a couple of nights with eyes swollen shut and necks and ankles large and lumpy. They came back to get some sleep and some calamine lotion.

From that time on nobody tried to escape at all. Everybody settled to the task of making Kapuskasing a better place, better and more mosquito-free.
