The Good Samaritan 30. Jesus made answer and said, A certain man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho; and he fell among robbers, who stripped him and beat him, and departed, leaving him half dead. 31. And by chance a certain priest was going down that way: and when he saw him, he passed by on the other side; 32. And in like manner a Levite also, when he came to the place, and saw him, passed by o the other side. 33. But a certain Samaritan, as he journeyed cam where he was: and when he saw him, he was moved with compar sion. The man who had fallen among the robbers was doubtless Jew; for, had he been otherwise, he fact would have been stated Now there was no question as to whether the word "neighbor" embraced their fellow countrymen; the question was whether it pas ed all their national bounds, opening up lines of duty across the out lying world. It is therefore almost a necessity that one who teaches this lesson should himself be an alien, a foreigner, and Jesus choo es the Samaritan as being of a race against which Jewish antipath' were especially strong. 
