Obituary
ROBERT J. CATHERWOOD
Robert J. Catherwood, a lifelong resident of Walpole Township, passed away at his home on Sunday evening, December 22nd, in his 81st year.

The late Mr. Catherwood, who has spent his entire life in this district by all who knew him. He was a devoted member of All Saint's Anglican Church in Hagersville.

The funeral was held from his late home at 2:30 o'clock on Tuesday with a public service in All Saint's Anglican Church.

He leaves five sons, to mourn his passing: Earl, Herbert, Lorne, Leslie and Thomas. Also two brothers, Thomas and John, both of British Columbia. His wife predeceased him about two years ago.

Another member of the train crew, John Knox, 578 James Street North, Hamilton, was injured. The train was an extra freight 17 cars, only 12 of which were loaded. When the train was derailed the engine turned over on its side, plunged into the ditch beside right-of-way near Willow Grove.

The cause of the accident has not been ascertained, but C.N.R. officials are conducting an investigation. The engineer was killed instantaneously and the fireman was scalded on his entire body. He was taken to Hamilton General Hospital where he died shortly after arrival. The train was a special freight travelling from Hamilton to Hagersville.
