

# Sunday School Lesson

LESSON V  
HOLDING LIFE SACRED. (A Principle of Temperate Living)

Genesis 1:27:1; 1 Corinthians 6:19  
20; 2 Corinthians 6:16-17.  
GOLDEN TEXT: "Ye were bought with a price; glorify God therefore in your body." 1 Cor. 6:20.

THE LESSON IN ITS SETTING  
Time: The First Epistle of Paul to the Corinthians was written in A.D. 57, and it is generally believed that the Second Epistle was written about a year later, probably in the same year.

Place: The First Epistle of Paul to the Corinthians was written from Ephesus. The Second Epistle was written in Macedonia, possibly from the city of Thessalonica.

27. And God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him: male and female created he them. We gather from the present chapter that God is a spirit, that he thinks, speaks, wills, and acts. The great points of conformity to God that man possesses are reason, speech, will and power. In the reason is freedom of the will. In the will is the ability to choose the good and refuse the evil. God formed the body of man in such a way as to make it a suitable habitation and instrument for His rational tenant. The mind and the body were made compatible and complementary. It was specifically the divine image, God in a spiritual or physical substance, and so is man's mind or soul.

Be Fruitful and Multiply  
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at the time of his creation (see Romans 8:18-23).  
Temple of the Holy Spirit  
1 Cor. 6:19. Or know ye not that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit which is in you, which ye have from God? and ye are not your own. Man has not only body and soul, but also spirit, dweller down below where the soul with its consciousness can enter, there is a spiriture linking man with God. In some people it is nothing more than a dormant power, a possibility waiting for the quickening of the Holy Spirit. (We are familiar with the division of the temple into three parts: there was its exterior with the outer court, seen by all men; the holy place, into which alone the priest might enter; God dwelt in the holiest of holies, where none might venture near.)

29. For ye were bought with a price, some with things of the world, some with the idols of men, some with silver, some with gold, some with merchandise, some with cunning, they have become subjects to man, as it was ordained to be.

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# FARM NOTES

## USE BETTER SEED

Opposition to ploughing poor marginal land to provide increased crop production to meet wartime needs, was expressed by W. R. Cook, deputy minister of agriculture, at a meeting of the agriculture committee of the Ontario Legislature. "The only way we can capitalize on high and dairy products is to produce more barley, oats, and mixed grains," said Mr. Cook.

"We know definitely that by use of better seed, farmers in Ontario can step up their crop production appreciably," said Mr. Cook.

J. E. Bergy, extension specialist of the poultry department of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph, suggests that a single grain diet is not satisfactory for laying hens. The 5 main grains are wheat, oats, barley, corn and buckwheat, any three of which should be used, but oats is the best single grain and should be one of the three used in a feed mixture. Mills is the most outstanding protein food, he said. Others may be meat, fish or liver meal. Minerals, he outlined, may include oyster shell or bone meal and for vitamins, cod liver oil, greens or yellow corn.

THE SEPARATED LIFE  
The late Frank H. Vitely, of the famed lexicographer, once said the English-speaking people need a new alphabet, and John H. Leavitt of Cincinnati believes he has it in his "phonobeta".

Leavitt, a retired carpenter, machineist and shoe designer, defines the "phonobeta" as a "scientific arrangement of letters in a logical sequence according to their sound values and the vocal mechanics of their utterance."

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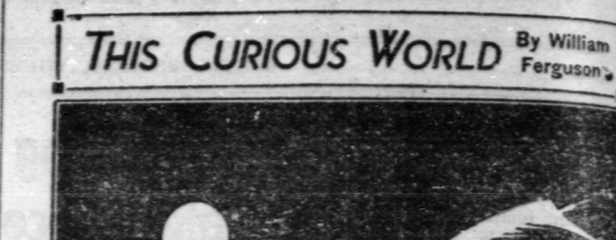
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# THIS CURIOUS WORLD

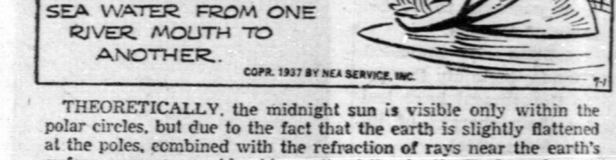

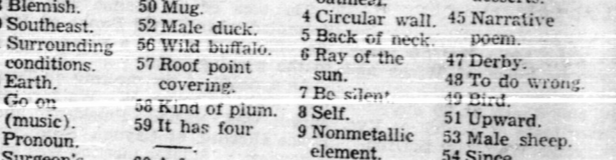
