The following item from the John O'Grout Journal, Wick, Scotland, of December 29th, 1939, will be of interest to representatives of the Clan Miller throughout this district:

"The death occurred at Courtnall, Brough, on Tuesday last week, at the residence of his son-in-law, Mr. John Miller, farmer, formerly of Malrose, May, after a long period of failing health. Mr. Miller, who was 83 years of age, was a member of a most highly respected family, but as he had come to the district within a year, and owing to his declining health, his acquaintance had not been fully cultivated. He was well known in the parish of Canohay where he had a large circle of friends. The funeral took place in Canohay Churchyard on Thursday last week. He is survived by his wife, three daughters and one son, to whom sympathy is extended."

"Deceased was a nephew of James and George Miller for many years residents of this locality."
