STATES FANNING MILL IMPORTANT IMPLEMENT

Now is Time to Recondition and Repair Mill, Says J. D. MacLeod, Ontario Department of Agriculture. Pamphlets Give Valuable Hints.

DEFENCE OF CANADA REGULATIONS

Regulation No. 39. No person shall (a) spread reports or make statements intended or likely to cause disaffection to His Majesty or to interfere with the success of His Majesty's forces or of the forces of any allied or associated Powers or to prejudice His Majesty's relations with foreign Powers.

(b) spread reports or make statements intended or likely to prejudice the recruiting, training, discipline, or administration of any of His Majesty's forces; or (c) spread reports or make statements intended or likely to prejudice the recruiting, training, discipline, or administration of any of His Majesty's forces.

No person shall print, make, publish, issue, circulate or distribute any book, newspaper, periodical, pamphlet, picture, paper, circular, card, letter, writing, print, publication or document of any kind containing any material, report or statement (a) intended or likely to cause disaffection to His Majesty or to interfere with the success of His Majesty's forces or of the forces of any allied or associated Powers, or to prejudice His Majesty's relations with foreign Powers;

(b) intended or likely to prejudice the recruiting, training, discipline, or administration of any of His Majesty's forces; or (c) intended or likely to prejudice the recruiting, training, discipline, or administration of any of His Majesty's forces.

(1) A prosecution for an offence against either regulation 39 or 39A of these Regulations shall not be instituted except by, or with the consent of, counsel representing the Attorney-General of Canada or of the Province.

(2) It shall be a defence to any prosecution for an offence against regulation 39 or 39A of these Regulations if the person prosecuted intended in good faith merely to criticize or to point out errors or defects in, the Government of Canada or in any province thereof, or in either House of Parliament of Canada or in any legislature or in the administration of justice.

A Weekly Review

Of National Affairs

Ottawa, February 27th. Aside from the constant anxiety with which news from abroad is being followed, particularly from Finland and the war areas at sea, interest at the Capital is centered just now on the election.

It would be misleading to say the interest in the campaign is "lukewarm" at least as yet, but the tempo is certainly rising, and the activities of campaigners are spreading like the rapid strides that have been made in the cooperative air training plan, which "might prove of the most essential and decisive character" in the war.

Other cabinet members including Mr. Rogers, Minister of National Defence and Mr. Power, Postmaster General, have described the extent of Canada's war effort on the military and industrial side. Mr. Ralston, Minister of Finance has said that in the coming fiscal year Canada will spend 500 million dollars on the war.

For the first year of the war, up to September first next, the Government's war effort will be 197 million, the navy 40 million, the air force 88 million, and the air training scheme 50 million.

From the Conservative standpoint, Dr. Manion has attacked the Government and has said that what he claims was the country's ill-preparedness for war, on the sickness of the effort, Canada's war effort on the general peace and war policy of the Government. He has stated that the Government's war effort in the past year has been the most successful in its history.

Four years ago the Government was without defences, especially when such threats were being made by the Axis powers. He said that the Government's war effort in the past year has been the most successful in its history.

He has criticized the Government for lack of legislation on social reform, for failure to implement recommendations of the Purvis commission on employment and for the wheat and coal marketing policies. He has further explained his plan for a national government and has bitterly denounced what he holds as the arbitrary use of governmental power in dissolving parliament, which he said was done by the Government on January 29th, 1939.

Mr. Woodworth, C.C.F. leader has also claimed that he sees the shadow of dictatorship in the Government's present policy instead of by free parliament.
