



Sound Health Habits Needed

Ontario's Health Minister Har old J. Kirby, in a recent address at Guelph, said that when the mass of people are prepared to ally themselies with the leaders in the scientific world the socalled preventable diseases will cease to exist.

STILL A CONCERN "There is, however, a signifi-cant number of disabling conditions, the control of which is still concerning the best minds in the field of medical research," Mr. Kirby told the Ontario Veter-

inary Association.

He was of the opinion that while much will ultimately be revealed as to the cause of thes diseases, the early establishment of sound health habits and a cor trolled program will do much to lower the death and sickness rates.

INSTRUCTION TO CHILDREN Mr. Kirby suggested suitable instructions should be given regularly to children and that provison should be made for early decovery and correction of physical defects so commonly found in early days of childhood. The minister said that a satisful prosecution of the war.
