1. Vigorous encouragement of all forms of co-operative marketing
2. Establishment of Export Boards to handle the export of farm products and to prevent the International Market from breaking down a fair price level for these products at home.
3. Protection of Fruit and Vegetable Growers through the imposition of seasonal tariffs and protection of the Dairy farmer and live stock producer from foreign competition.

It provides for a system of price maintenance and stabilization, for the products of the farm. Nearly every line of endeavor in Canada except agriculture has enjoyed these benefits for years.

It provides for ample protection of the farmer from foreign competition. 35 million pounds of fresh pork entered Canada in the last 13 months from the United States. This is equivalent to 230,000 hogs and it entered practically free of duty. - Mr. King's Government removed the duty.

150 million pounds of vegetable oils produced in the tropics were consumed by the people of Canada last year and replaced Canadian butter, lard, tallow, etc. Mr. King's Government refused to impose a duty of 3 cents per lb. on this oil although the tariff board recommended it, and the National Dairy Council and other farm organizations urged it.

Mr. King's efforts to aid agriculture for the past four years have been in the form of temporary expedients. Instance the pegging of wheat prices which was most unsatisfactory and which did not reach the root of the difficulty.

the order paper. And many more would have followed. One example of what I mean by this was startlingly revealed in a question by the M.P. from Lincoln in 1933, regarding a rifle range that had been purchased for use of the Government in that County. Three parcels of land were purchased at a total cost of \$113,000 and it was found the assessed value of the land was only \$11,600. I mention this merely as an instance of what might have been revealed had parliament been permitted to continue, said Mr. Senn. My opinion of Prime Minister Mackenzie King was lowered when he made the statement that neither he nor any of his cabinet members would co-operate in any way with a National Government if it was elected, said Mr. Senn.

During the Twenty years I have represented this constituency in Ottawa, I have always attempted to work for the constituents regardless of political affiliation. Nor have I been a silent member of the House. I have tried to present the views of the constituents in Parliament. E. A. McCarter was chairman of the meeting and other speakers included Thos. Elmore, K.C., of Toronto and formerly of Springfield, Ill. A. Given, formerly of Saskatchewan and Geo. L. Miller, of New York. Two Hundred attended the meeting.

"We don't know whether to put in a lease or not," Hare said. "We haven't heard of the government, and we don't want to be taken in. We don't want to be taken in by the government, we would like to know where we stand."

Hare stated the agents had warned some farmers not to plant this season. Prices offered for the farm lands were so low, the farmers claim.

"If they put me out on the road before I'll cash at their price," Hare declared.

A Bad Offer

Cecil Warner is believed by the farmers to have had the "worst of it." Warner has 55 acres of land. He was offered \$2,400 for the whole 55 acres. Warner said, "In less than three years I can make almost a third as much again as that off my land. I'd be a fool to let it go."

He told government agents, he said that he figured his acre held by American Airways was equal to a \$5,000 investment at 5 per cent.

"I want that much at least," Warner declared.

John Hevington, who has 116 acres 30 of which is leased by American Airways, paying him \$245 a year was offered \$5,000 for his entire farm, he said.

Angry Farmers Will Block Ottawa Air Scheme Grab

Claim King Government Agents Seeking Land Masters of Hundreds - Prices Too Low.

Brantford, March 23 - With cries of a "rotten deal" from King Government agents, eight of a dozen farmers of Walpole Township, Haldimand County, are preparing to "stand together" to prevent their exploitation by the Government in obtaining land for an airport site as a link in the Empire air training scheme.

Haldimand Returns Mark C. Senn With Majority of 800

WILL BE SIXTH CONSECUTIVE TERM FOR VETERAN HALDIMAND MEMBER

Mark C. Senn, National Government Candidate for the County of Haldimand, was returned to parliament in Tuesday's voting by the substantial majority of around 800 over his opponent Dr. E. N. Macaulay.

Although completed figures for all polls in the riding are not yet available, the results in Walpole Township indicate that the condition of the roads made it impossible for a great many people to get out and cast their ballot. In the 1935 election over sixteen hundred voters made their way to the polls while in Tuesday's voting only thirteen hundred and seven ballots were cast. As a result of this fact, the Liberal majority in Walpole, which is considered the stronghold of the party was reduced somewhat.

Hagersville changed a Liberal majority of fifteen in 1935 to a Conservative majority of sixty-nine. Caledonia increased their majority for Mark Senn from 252 in 1935 to 312. The Conservative majority in Port Dundas was reduced from nearly 1100 to 687. Jarvis remained practically unchanged with Mark Senn a majority of Seventy-four. Other municipalities giving a majority vote to Dr. Macaulay were: Cambourne, Cayuga, North Cayuga, South Cayuga, Rainham and Sherbrooke. Senn led in Dunn, Moulton, Oudela and Seneca besides the municipalities previously mentioned.

This will be the sixth consecutive time the voters of Haldimand County have endorsed Mark Senn as their representative at Ottawa. He was first elected in 1921 and has been returned by substantial majorities in each succeeding election.

The War Supply Board, under the chairmanship of Mr. Wallace Campbell, which has the duty of making all purchases of all equipment and supplies needed in Canada's war effort, has issued a statement of all contracts which it has made from November 1st last year to March 1st. During the four months contracts total over 100 million dollars, while purchases made by the Defence Purchasing Board which preceded the War Supply Board amounted to 42 million. The contracts cover a wide range of every sort of material for the active service forces from small consignments of nails to aircraft and vessels. Orders have been placed in 15 Canadian shipyards for the construction of anti-submarine patrol vessels with a total value of over 37 million dollars, over 9 million dollars will be paid for the construction of mine sweepers now being built in British Columbia shipyards. Contracts for aircraft, appearing in the report reach a total of over ten million dollars while in addition numerous contracts have been placed with the British Air Ministry for planes which according to agreement the British government delivers free of charge for the Commonwealth Air Training Plan.
