OVER-FAT AND OVER-WEIGHT HOGS

Two or three years ago when feed supplies were limited farmers were marketing light and unfinished hogs. For the last couple of years with plentiful feed supplies many hogs are over-fat and over-weight.

Packers have been forced to protest against both of these conditions. This has led some producers to ask what does the packer want anyway. The fact is the market requirements do not change. What is wanted all the time are hogs of proper weights and proper finish.

As the export market for light and heavy bacon is very limited and there is practically no market for over-fat bacon all such hogs have to be consumed at home. However, the Canadian housewife reacts just as unfavorably to over-fat and over-weight or to skimping bacon as does the over-seas consumer. The packer can trim the heavy fat off backs, shoulders and hams at a serious waste and loss. But he can do nothing with the side or breakfast bacon. And it is this bacon that is the general favorite in Canada.

We now want to get Canadian consumers to eat an increased quantity of pork products for a time until Britain's requirements increase. The fat and heavy bacon which packers have to handle is a dead weight on efforts to increase home consumption and thus maintain hog prices. Producers should realize these facts and take care to feed their hogs a ration that will not over-fatten them and, as a result, reduce their market value.

A Weekly Review Of National Affairs

Ottawa, May 21.—The first session of the 19th Parliament of Canada has met in an atmosphere of that deep concern is the determination voiced in the Speech from the Throne, "to share in the utmost of our strength." The progress of the war in Europe is practically the sole topic of discussion at Ottawa and it is clear from the speech from the Throne and the general attitude of parliamentarians that issues not connected with the war will be put in a subordinate position in parliamentary debate. On the opening day, the Prime Minister asked for the cooperation of all parties in the great task of the war. "Responsibility does not mean monopoly of government" said Mr. King. 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There are a great many new faces on the floor of the house, and many well known faces are missing.

Among the latter are, of course, Dr. Manion, former leader of the Conservative Party, who has now retired from the arena, Miss MacPhail, Mr. Cahon, Mr. White and many others. Many of these will be sincerely missed but their defeat in the last election is due to the unstable fortunes of political life. Others have taken their place, and will be making their selves heard in the forum of Parliament at this grave hour. There is only one woman member in the Commons in this Parliament. She is Mrs. Nielsen from Saskatchewan, who received a cordial welcome from fellow members.

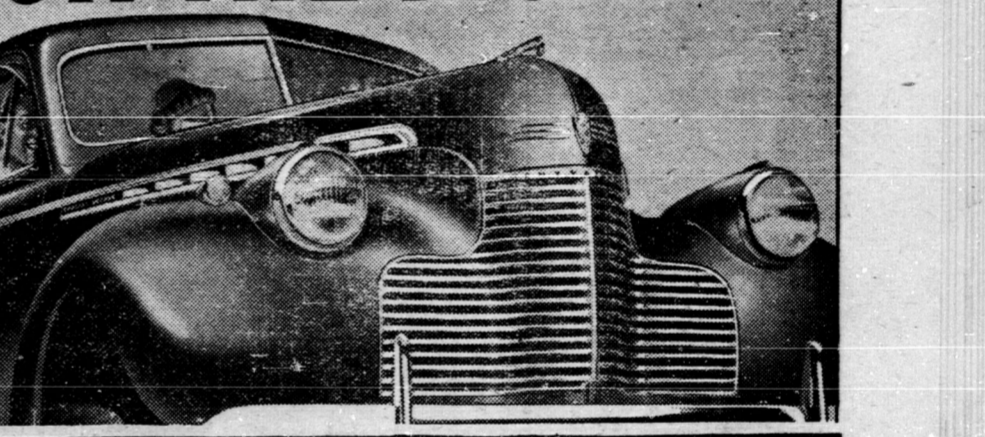
On the order paper is a resolution placed there by Mr. Woodworth, C.P.F. leader, asking for a parliamentary committee to review the Defence of Canada Regulations which he considers too severe.

Parliament too is the impressive report of the Royal Commission of Dominion-Provincial Relations. This Commission, formerly known as the Rowell Commission, was at work for more than two and a half years. It carried out a monumental task, and its findings are overshadowed at this time by the urgency of the dangers facing the country, they represent one of the most serious efforts ever attempted to find solutions for Canada's financial, economic and social problems. Among the more important of the recommendations advanced by the Commission is the assumption by the Federal Government of Provincial debts with the abandonment by the provinces of income, corporation and inheritance taxes. The recommendations however cover much too wide a field to be reviewed in the small space at our disposal. A point which will be carefully studied by both Dominion and Provincial governments is what suggestions made by the Commission such as for example those relating to simplification and unification of taxation may promise genuine help to the country in its war effort. The financing of the costs of war is of course of the most vital of the duties of the government and Parliament, and the recommendations of the Commission will be before members as they study and discuss the war budget and the estimates.
