

United States markets varied from two to four cents lower than the Canadian hog market levels, and Canada had no outlets for her hogs other thas Great Britain and the domestic market. A storage program was undertaken by the Board against the day when weekly marketings would be of insufficient volume to take care of the weekly overseas shipments.




