RAPID PROGRESS BEING MADE AT JARVIS BOMBING AND GUNNERY SCHOOL

planes unloaded their bombs on a thirty-foot triangular target a half mile from shore in Lake Erie.

The bomb hits are recorded from two observation posts located a half mile apart on the shore line, and the accuracy of the bombing is charted at the Air Force by the time the planes return. While a hit within fifty yards is regarded as very good going according to Squadron Leader Cameron, the students were exceeding themselves on Thursday, and many of the bombs appeared to be a good deal closer than that. In fact one bomb seemed to land within a few feet of the objective.

"You'll stick to your job at Jarvis" is the motto adopted by the school. Readers of the Record, who for the most part are located within the borders of the Township of Walpole, may not be quick to understand the reason for this. But apparently strangers to our municipality have never before witnessed the peculiarities of "Walpole Clay."

We regard it, and rightfully so, as the finest soil in God's universe, it's inherent qualities have carried considerable weight with the Air Force, particularly on their shoes.

It is gratifying, however, that in addition to growing of excellent crops, "Walpole Clay" has provided such an excellent motto for the largest Bombing and Gunnery School, in the biggest Air Training Scheme the world has ever known.

It is evident however, from the work being carried on by contractors at the school that within a few months this wonder about the derivative of the motto. Awarded Damages in Accident Case

Plaintiffs Permitted to Take Money Out of Country

Five American residents from Stamford, Conn. were awarded \$5000 for damages for injuries received in a motor accident six miles east of Jarvis, September 1st, 1938, by the Supreme Court Jury in Hamilton on Thursday. Action entered by the American Residents was entered for \$50,000.

The plaintiffs were Fred and Freda Robbins, Adeline Wagner and Leo and Cecile Norman all of Stamford, Conn. and the action arose as a result of an accident with a truck driven by Harold Young of Cayuga and owned by Henry Cole of Jarvis.

While it was first reported that Dominion War Time Legislation would prevent the plaintiffs from taking the money out of the Country until the war is over, a ruling from Ottawa was to the effect that nothing in the Foreign Exchange Control Board's regulations would prevent U.S. residents taking home in Canadian Dollars money awarded him in a Canadian Court in settlement of a damage claim.

Civic Guard to March on West End of County

Motorcade of Civic Volunteer Guards from Dunnville, Selkirk and Jarvis on October 17th.

A motorcade of Civic Volunteer Guards from Dunnville, Selkirk and Jarvis will "take" the West end of the County on Thursday, October 17th, with the object of stimulating interest in the Volunteer Home Guard Movement there.

The itinerary will include three stops, first at Caledonia, where the guards will march through the main street, with a brief stop for an address outlining the movement if this is desired, thence to Hagersville and Jarvis, where the same routine will be repeated.

It is not necessary to stress either the need or importance of the Volunteer Guards, and it is felt that a little impetus will give the movement just the start it needs in the west end of the County. One thing is needed, however, is a leader in each of the three towns mentioned, and anyone interested is urged to write or call on County Commissioner Dr. R. D. Blott, at Dunnville before the above date if possible, when plans can be discussed as to the procedure desired on the night of the County tour.
