way from you. Keep matches away

from children and do not permit

smoking in barns or near combustible

material. Do not throw matches

operations, insist on everybody clearing

their pockets of matches and

place them in a safe container.

Gasoline or kerosene should never

be used for heating. Never fill

lamps, lanterns, kerosene or gasoline

stoves while they are burning. If

necessary to keep small quantities of

gasoline, it should be kept in an ap-

proved safety can painted red and

labeled "Gasoline". Small

quantities of kerosene should be kept

in closed cans of a size and shape

different from that holding gasoline

in order to lessen the chance of mis-

taking the one for the other.

Heating Equipment

Heating equipment should be pro-

perly installed, operated and main-

tained. Wooden floors under stoves

should be well protected. The

sides and back of stoves and ranges

should be at least three feet from

woodwork or wood lath and plaster

partitions. Avoid long runs of

smoke pipes. The sections should be

securely joined and the pipes sup-

ported at frequent intervals. Smoke

pipes should be at least eighteen in-

ches from unprotected woodwork.

They should not pass through roof

or closets or enter a chimney in an

attic, and they should be cleaned at

least twice a year.

Electrical Wiring

Electrical wiring and repair work

should be done by a competent elec-

trical contractor. Circuits should

not be overloaded and fuses of the

correct amperage (15 ampers for the

ordinary branch circuits) should be

used. Disconnect irons, curling

irons, heating pads and other ap-

pliances when not in use.

Remove all possible fire hazards

and be prepared to fight a fire if it

occurs. Chemical extinguishers

pump tank extinguishers and a good

supply of water and ladders should

be available on every farm.

American plowmen will draw lots for

the 175 sturdy plow teams being

provided, while over 200 tractor

teams will be competing each morning

in the plowing fields.

It is a sight worth seeing.

And valuable trophies and

prizes in the Horse-drawn compe-

titions which will attract the best

blacksmiths in Canada. This fea-

ture has grown rapidly and arrange-

ments have been made to accom-

modate large numbers of spectators.

Large numbers of spectators, in-

teresting and educational demon-

strations will be daily features of

the match. They include farm drain-

age, cultural implements, row crop

tractor, hybrid corn trials, pick-up

baler, plow setting, multiple hitch,

combine harvesting, seed cleaning

and soil testing. There will also be

exhibits by the Ontario Department

of Health, Ontario, Forestry De-

partment, grading of farm products,

tripod hay, and farm products of

Elgin.

The last day of the Match (Friday

October 18) will see a parade of

some 3,000 members of the R.C.A.F.

through the grounds of the Tented

City at 2 P.M. Premier M. F. Hep-

burn will take the salute. These

Air Force men are in training at

the largest technical air training school

in Canada, having taken over the

Ontario Hospital buildings adjoining

the plowing match site.

The Plowing Match will give hun-
