Montreal — Statistics released by  
the Association of American Rail-  
roads which cover activities in Can-

that in 1930 the average speed of

62 per cent greater than in 1920. It  
is also shown that for hauling a ton  
of freight one mile the railways now  
receive 24 per cent less than they did  
in 1921.

MILLIONAIRE**

About the time James Francis-  
chini was arrested under the Defen-  
ce of Canada Regulations, a Cana-  
dian named Pat Sullivan was in  
under the same regulations. At  
the time of the arrest Mr. Francis-  
chini was an active war worker.  
Mr. Sullivan an active trade union

Mr. Franceschini had occasionally  
been suspected of sympathy with  
Fascist Italy, a country with which  
Canada is at war. Mr. Sullivan was  
occasionally suspected of sym-  
pathy with communist Russia, a  
country with which Canada is at  
war. Of the reasons for the  
arrests, that is all the public  
knew or is permitted to know.  
Their trials, if the two have  
them, if they are sentences, are as  
unrevealed as their offenses.

It would be a terrible thing if the  
processes of freedom were tampered  
so that Mr. Franceschini or, or  
picion, be deprived of liberty and  
freedom. It would be a betrayal  
by our paid servants if using  
the war as pretext, Mr. Sullivan  
or Mr. Franceschini were denied  
the fair trial and the justice the  
highest, as to the lowest income  
brackets in every British land.

It would be no less terrible and  
not less a betrayal if freedom's vol-  
unteers were to be found on  
ward only when the victims of ty-  
ranny had influential connections and  
large bank accounts.
