SOLDIERS DON'T GET PASSES

was riding in from the West the winter of '38 with a couple of boys from Winnipeg. One of them was a kid younger than me and newer the kid, getting ready to drop as the freight loaded for the yards and the top of the cars; a great big guy with his face and hair all the same color.

"The kid's chin was even with the car-roof when Red got to him and I saw this car; a great big guy with his face and hair all the same color."

"Sure, I've seen them, crippling around the edges of things, out of work and out of friends and nobody giving a damn because nobody's afraid of them. It's not going to happen that with us. It's just not going to happen that way."

"This talk about fighting for my country doesn't take on me, much; or on the others in our bunch either. We know what we're fighting for. We're fighting for our last chance of a square deal all around and a job of work all around. If we don't get it when we're finished off the Jerries it's going to be too bad for a lot of people that are shooting us the patriotic line now."

"Don't get me wrong. I'm not doing any mean about the war. I'm doing the freight. There's ways for a kid to get an education and see the country. And I'm not sorry I joined up either. The army's got me out of the streets and I know some things the fellows didn't know. I'm not keeping a secret for a while back."

"For instance, I'm not forgetting for the country that hadn't a cent to spare and they're out on the road into steady work when I'm out my share of freight-hopping a lousy contractor eighty-five cents a foot. It doesn't make sense, and this war is over a hell of a long time. It doesn't make sense when you take it apart and find out what it's all about. Gee, what a road."

"That'll be the day. Gee, what a road."

"Come to think of it, I won't be doing a lot of fighting for the boys. I'm just going to feed 'em."
