The member asked for a program to meet the urgent needs of the present crisis and peace time requirements after the war. Several members took part in the debate, some complaining that the Maritimes had not been used to their full in the shipbuilding program. The minister for naval services and the minister of supply explained the situation. In the Maritimes the difficulty had been over facilities for the building of steel craft. Mr. Howe said that Canada would build ships to the country's productive capacity. An "All out" program had been organized. It couldn't be a lightning like expansion. The construction of merchant shipbuilding had been placed in "separate and most capable hands" and was being organized on a "very sound basis." Contracts had been placed for the building of 20 merchant ships of 10,000 tons each. They would each cost \$1,-500,000.

The need of an increasing number

The need of an increasing number of ships to defeat the submaring menace was emphasized by the new British High Commissioner of Canada, Malcolm MacDonald who arrived a few days ago in Ottawa to take over his duties. The High Commissioner in an interview spoke with the most profound appreciation of the part played by Canada in the war. "They (the enemy) couldn't beat us in Britain even if we were fighting alone." he said.
