MATHE SYRUP IS IN THE NEWS

Actively in the sugar bush is a sign that spring is not far away, because the warm sunshine which starts the sap running has quickly met the last of the winter's snow.

The value of the Canadian maple syrup is not in its wood alone for tree is not over thousands of gallons of syrup are made from the maple sap.

The consumer's selection of maple syrup will appear in the grocers' windows, to tell the public that the syrup is in season.

Spring is naturally associated with maple syrup because it is made at this season but it is really a year-round temperature. In sealed sterile containers (preferably glass) the syrup retains its color and flavor and other distinctive qualities, indefinitely.

The Dominion Department of Agriculture suggests a few ways of using maple syrup in addition to the commonest use of maple syrup with toast, pancakes, waffles, fritters, hot biscuits or muffins.
