THE WEED OF THE WEEK

PERENNIAL SOW THISTLE
Perennial Sow Thistle - another of those European weed pests - is still one of the worst weeds in Ontario. A menace to Ontario agriculture, it is found in every county and district says John D. MacLeod, Ont. Dept. of Agriculture.

In certain sections this weed has made profitable crop production extremely difficult. It thrives in cultivated and uncultivated land, in grain fields, newly seeded meadows roadsides, ditches and uncleared land. Sow Thistle grows most vigorously and spreads most rapidly in heavy, damp soils. land. Sow Thistle grows most vigorously and spreads most rapidly in heavy, damp soils.

The Perennial Sow Thistle has deep yellow flowers; is tall, coarse-growing, deep-rooted, with large vigorous are 4 to 12 inches long, deeply cut, with the segments pointed backwards. The stem is smooth and hollow and the whole plant is filled with a bitter milky juice.
