PICTURING THE HOUSE



A pictures of the house in the daytime—but how about a picture at night? All you need is a location to the distance of the car from the house and the brightness of the lights; so it is best to take several where the camera won't be dis- shots, increasing the exposure time where the camera won't be disturbed, and, of course, a camera that can be set for a time exposure.

means. The light doesn't have to be extremely strong—if it is weaker, you just expose for a longer time—but the illumination should be fairly even on the side of the house that you picture.

For just a portion of the house, you can use a flash bulb, if your camera has a fast lens and is loaded with high speed film. For example, if you have an f/4.5 lens, the flash can be used 40 or 50 feet from house lights show up brightly. Only
