He graduated from Wycliffe and was ordained in St. Thomas' Church in this city in 1918. His first parish was at Fort Chipewyan, Northern Alberta, and it was in such missionary work in the far north that Mr. Gibson made what was probably his most valuable contribution to the principle.



### FIRST CANADIAN FORT IS REBUILT



Nova Scotia went back more than 300 years for the plans which were used in reconstructing the Port Royal Habitation, which housed the first Europeans to settle in America north of the Gulf of Mexico — and which was recently opened to the public by the Hon.
