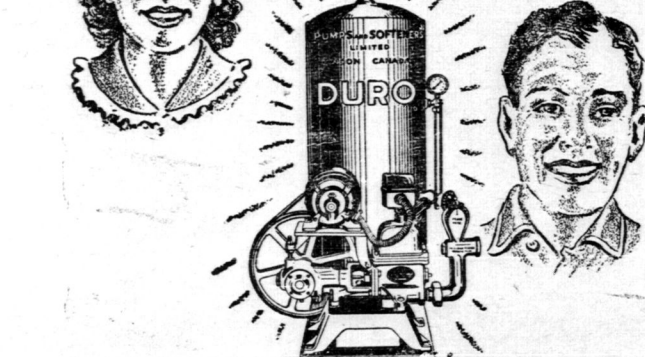

She spent her early life in the Nanticoke district, having been born on the third concession of Walpole and since her marriage resided on the lake front about two miles from Nanticoke Village. She was a member of the Nanticoke United Church.

Besides her husband, she leaves one daughter and six sons: Ella (Mrs. William Crawford), Arthur (Mrs. William Crawford), and five others.

Funeral services will be held at the Nanticoke United Church on Sunday, July 6th, at 11:00 A.M.

REV. W. GIBSON PASSES FOLLOWING LENGTHY ILLNESS The death occurred on Friday, June 27th, of Rev. Wm. Gibson, a former resident of Nanticoke, and former resident of Nanticoke, Ontario. He was a member of the Crocker-Whitely College, Toronto, in 1914 to study for the ministry.
