

## SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

### LESSON III RESPONSIBILITY OF THE CHURCH REGARDING BEVERAGE ALCOHOL

**Golden Text:** "Ye are the salt of the earth."—Matt. 5:13.

**The Lesson in Its Setting:** The Apostle Paul, writing to the Corinthians, was in prison in Rome, shortly before his death, A.D. 65.

**Place:** The city of Corinth was located in the northern extremity of Greece. Titus, when he received this Epistle, was probably exercising his ministry in the island of Crete.

**Keeping God Company:** Paul's first Epistle to the great Church at Corinth was almost entirely devoted to two primary questions:—the personal purity among Christians, and the problems that arise in the institution known as the Church of Christ, problems of fellowship, of Church government, of doctrine, etc. In this passage, these two problems of purity and Church life are brought together.

**Cor. 5:9:** "I wrote unto you in my epistle to have no company with fornicators; not at all meaning with the fornicators of this world, or with the covetous and extortioners, or with idolaters; for then must ye needs go out of the world."

Paul of course is not concerned with cataloguing all the flagrant sinners in the world. He mentions three classes as being sufficient for his purpose. A covetous person is greedy, avaricious, often crooked. An extortioner is of the same type, but he does not stop even at violent measures to rob others. What Paul wants the Corinthians to know is that what he meant in his former (and now lost) epistle, by not keeping company with fornicators, is that he meant to keep no company with such people in the world, whether they had business dealings with them or not.

**Dealings with the Wicked:** 12. "But as it is, I wrote unto you not to keep company, if any man that is named a brother be a fornicator, or covetous, or an idolater, or a reviler, or a drunkard, or an extortioner; with such a one no, not to eat." Among the ancients, for a man to receive any at his table, was much more a sign of intimacy than in our day; and the apostle is unwilling that by the sign of so close a personal relation, the idea should be authorized that the vicious man is acknowledged by other Christians as worthy of the name.

13. "For what have I to do with judging them that are without? Do not ye judge them that are within? 13. But they that are without God judge them. Put away the wicked man from among yourselves." Paul here is reminding the Corinthians that he is speaking directly and exclusively to those that are in the Church, and he brings his admonition on this particular point to a powerful conclusion by saying that those who were in the Church, practising these things should be put out of the Church; the Church since has suffered greatly because it has neglected this part of the New Testament teaching concerning Church membership. Such action today might cause some consternation in our complacent membership, but it might bring a stirring, surprising, awakening message to an unbelieving world.

**Centine Christian Character:** Titus was a Greek Christian, an intimate friend of the Apostle Paul, a companion of the great missionary in some of his apostolic journeys, and probably one of his converts. Here it appears that Titus, together with an unnamed brother, had been sent to Corinth, as the apostle's delegate to the Corinthian Church, where his chief business was evidently to deal with the cases of immorality which had occurred there. Titus was later left on the island of Crete, to set in order the Church there. In Paul's Epistle to Titus, he advises him how to deal with the various cases of persons met with.

**Titus 2:1:** "But speak thou the things which befit the sound doctrine." Sound doctrine is, of course, the truth relating to the Christian religion, is understood by the mind and cherished and held by the heart, having its fruits in the daily conduct. 2. "That aged men be temperate, grave, sober-minded, sound in faith, in love, in patience, 3. That aged women likewise be reverent in demeanor, not slanderous nor enslaved to much wine, teachers of that which is good; 4. That

### Post-War Plan To Ban Bombers

League of Nations Group In England Would Abolish Them Together With Other Aggressive Weapons of War

An "effective collective system of defence" enforced by armed international authority is the basis of a post-war policy for the world outlined by the League of Nations union executive committee presented at a union meeting on June 20th.

**Abolition of aggressive weapons and supervision to prevent their construction** also should be achieved by international agreement, the committee said.

**When War's Over:** "We believe," the committee added, "that when this war is over there will be a popular demand in all countries for the abolition of bombing aircraft and if the demand should lead to the abolition of military air forces and to international control of civil aviation, it would be possible for the first time to have an international authority with a weapon possessed by no national state."

Hungry for home-made bread? Nostalgia is needless when a recipe for making bread like mother used to make is the simple, home-made bread. All-Brant bread is a jiffy. Do this way: 1 egg 24 cups flour 1 cup milk 1 cup sugar 2 tablespoons melted shortening 3 teaspoons baking powder 3 cups chopped nut meats. Beat eggs and sugar until light. Add milk, shortening and nut meats. Sift flour with salt and baking powder; combine wet mixtures; add to first mixture, stirring only until flour disappears. Bake in greased loaf pan with waxed paper in the bottom, 1 hour and 10 minutes. Yield: 1 loaf (4½ x 9½ inch pan).

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## What Science Is Doing

**SUPER-FUEL FOR PLANES**

A new analyzing device which scientists hope will aid hemisphere defense by paving the way to development of a "super-fuel" for combustion engines—particularly those of high speed fighter and bomber planes—was displayed last week in Pittsburgh by its discoverer.

## TOOTH DECAY ARRESTED

Evidence that caries, or tooth decay, can be produced in animals by a deficient diet and that natural repair of the damaged teeth can take place under an adequate diet is presented in experiments carried on by Dr. Reider F. Sognegard, of the University of Rochester (N.Y.) School of Medicine and Dentistry. Rats were kept on a diet of coarse corn which is deficient in a number of dietary essentials and long has been recognized as a producer of caries. Studies were made of the manner in which the decay processes affected the rats' teeth. Part of the original group was kept on a control and received normal diet. At the end of two months the teeth of these rats were examined and a surprising change was discovered. The cavities were filled and presented a polished appearance.

## GOLD HALTS ARTHRITIS

Treatment of arthritis, a deforming disease of joints, by injection of a treatment of gold has halted the destructive process of the disease in 70 per cent of cases, but no cure is known, Dr. Wallace Graham of Toronto told the Canadian Medical Association annual convention. The injections are made in the hip.

## ANTI-BLOOD CLOT FLUID

Two Swedish physicians report that they have developed a substance that keeps blood from clotting, helps prevent thrombosis, which at times causes death or prolonged disability after operations.

In thrombosis, which sometimes develops after surgery, a clot or plug forms in a blood vessel or heart cavity. The physicians gave the drug to several patients after surgery and not one of them developed thrombosis.

## How Can I?

**Q.** How can I remove the disagreeable odor that dish towels and cloths sometimes acquire?

**A.** Add a little ammonia to the water when washing them, and they will again become fresh and clean.

**Q.** How can I drive away red ants?

**A.** Four liquid corrosive sublimate on pieces of cotton and lay the cotton where the ants are likely to travel. Another effective remedy is alum dissolved in boiling water and applied with a brush.

**Q.** How can I relieve perspiring hands?

**A.** Try applying two or three times a day, or at least nightly, an astringent lotion consisting of one part boracic acid to twenty parts of water, and then dust with talcum powder.

**Q.** How can I soften brown sugar and make it easier to measure?

**A.** Place it in a flat baking pan and put into the oven for a few minutes. However, this must be watched closely to prevent burning.

**Q.** How can I remove berry stains from the fingers?

**A.** Moisten some cornmeal with vinegar and rub over the stains. They will disappear.

## C. N. E. to Get Relics of War

Include Nazi Planes and Bits of Palace, House of Commons

Canadian National Exhibition officials announced last week that through auspices of the British Department of Overseas Trade and the Ministry of Information and in cooperation with the Trade Administration and Air Ministry, a display of relics of the present war is being sent to Canada to be exhibited at this year's exhibition.

## FIRST TO LEAVE BRITAIN

The exhibit is expected to include a Messerschmitt 109 fighter shot down over Britain, a complete escape apparatus taken from a captured German submarine, technical parts from shot-down Junkers and Messerschmitt fighters. One section will display relics from bombed Buckingham Palace, Westminster Abbey, St. Paul's Cathedral, the British House of Commons and old Westminster Hall.

The proceeds from admission fees paid to see the exhibit will be turned over to a British war fund.

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
