If we compare these figures with those for manufacturing industry we find that the average annual wages per worker for the years, 1926 to 1929 were \$1,017, and for the succeeding nine years to 1937 they av eraged \$902., a drop of twelve per cent as compared with the 53 per cent in the case of the farmer. No ne has envied the position of the worker in Industry during the pas decade with his short time and low income, but in comparison the posttion of the Farmer is desperate.

According to the figures of the last census the average investmen in a Canadian farm was \$7,000. i round figures. In spite of this fact the average income for the "good" years 1926-1929 was slightly less than the average wages of a worker in Industry with no personal in vestment whatsoever.
