The second part of the Acts of the Apostles is generally reck-oned to begin with the thirteenth chapter. At this point St. Paul emerges as the principal charac ter, and the narrative, gradually widening and expanding with his travels, seems intended to des-cribe to us, in minute detail, the communication of the Gospel to the Gentiles. The thirteenth and fourteenth chapters embrace a definite and separate subject: the first journey of the first Christian missionaries to the heathen. Acts 12:25. "And Barnabas and Saul returned from Jerusalem, when they had fulfilled their ministration, taking with them John whose surname was Mark." John was a relative of Barnabas. He appears next in the history as their associate in missionary

The Church at Antioch "Now there were at Antioch, in the church that was there, prophets and teachers, Barnabas, and Symeon that was called Niger, and Lucius of Cyrene, and Manaen the foste brother of Herod the tetrarch, and Saul." The Herod referred to here is the one who put John the Baptist to death. By "prophets" was meant men inspired by the Holy Spirit with a direct message from God—they were commonly also teachers; "teachers" were those who gave instructions to believers. 2. stered to the Lord, and fasted, the Holy Spirit said, Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them. 8. "Then, when they had fasted and prayed and laid their hands on them, they sent them away. 4. 
## FARM FORUM

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS Q. How should queens reared at nome be introduced? "A. E.—Lin-

A. Queens are usually reared in nuclei. The queen can then be in-troduced by placing her with the adhering bees on two combs in the centre of the queenless colony The bees will accept the queen quite readily if this is carried out at mid-day, while a little nectar is coming in.

Q. What use is Sulphur as a fertilizer? I know it is used on pipes in greenhouses to stop mildew. Would it be good for Cucum bers and how would you use it?
"S. F. A.—Wentworth Co." A. Sulphur is rarely used as a soil amendment except where there are strong alkaline conditions. Even although certain crops remove almost as much Sulphur as Phosphorus, still there seems to be enough of this element added to the oil in rain water and in Sulphate forms of fertilizers to meet the needs. For instance:-Where Superphosphate is added, almost onehalf of this material is Calcium Sulphate which is a provider of Sulphur. 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
